COE Update

Recently on October 18th, the Senate LHHS Appropriations Subcommittee released its proposed funding bill for FY 2022. In this bill, TRIO would receive an increase of \$185.8 million, or a 17% increase, for a total appropriation of \$1.28 billion for FY 2022. This is a great down payment on COE's goal of doubling TRIO in the next four years! This will provide a boost for the upcoming Upward Bound, Upward Bound Math-Science, Veterans Upward Bound, and the Ronald E. McNair Postbaccalaureate programs to expand the number and size of the awards. The legislation also directs the Department of Education to use part of the allocation to fund high-scoring applications in the FY21 Talent Search and Educational Opportunity Centers and FY20 Student Support Services competitions. This will clearly have implications in the NEOA region to possibly fund additional awards! This proposed Senate also would increase the maximum Pell Grant by \$400 to \$6,895 and provide a \$32 million increase or 9% increase for GEAR UP, for a total appropriation of \$400 million.

Overall great news coming out of D.C. for low-income, first-generation students...but we still need the powers that be to push it over the finish line!

NH Educational Opportunity Association



Upward Bound - SUNY Plattsburgh

Upward Bound at SUNY Plattsburgh participated in COE's Good Trouble Book Club during their summer program, reading the John Lewis' graphic novel series, March. All rising sophomores read the series and participated in group discussions facilitated by Brian Post and other local leaders who also read the series. Two of these were Christopher Rosenquest, mayor of the City of Plattsburgh, and Michael Cashman, Supervisor of the Town of Plattsburgh. Both are TRIO alumni, with Mr. Rosenquest participating in the

Upward Bound Program at SUNY Plattsburgh, and Mr. Cashman participating in the Student Support Services Program, also at SUNY Plattsburgh. Participants were then joined by USDE Secretary Cardona for the final book discussion with other Upward Bound programs across the country. He discussed the John Lewis books, told his personal story, and took questions

from the students...overall it was a great experience!

CCRI TRIO Programs

On Tuesday, October 12, 2021 U.S. Senator Jack Reed visited the Liston Campus in Providence to meet with CCRI students and alumni who have benefitted from the college's TRIO programs, which are federally-funded programs to help Rhode Islanders overcome barriers to starting and completing a post-secondary education.

The college recently received two five-year TRIO grants from the U.S. Department of Education totaling \$7.4 million to continue providing Rhode Island Educational Talent Search (RIETS) and Opportunity Center (RIEOC) services to more than 4,000 low-income and first-generation Rhode Islanders.

Sen. Reed, a strong advocate for TRIO and a member of the Appropriations Committee, spoke with 17 former and current CCRI students, each of whom shared their experiences working with advisors and counselors before, during, and even after college. From first-generation students who needed help filling out Financial Aid paperwork to those who required an additional push now and then to stay on track, each shared examples of how TRIO programs kept them engaged and focused on completing their educational journey. "Programs like this are necessary everywhere," said Marcin Pawlukiewicz of Cumberland, a Polish immigrant who enrolled in ESL courses upon moving to the United States and is now pursuing his bachelor's degree at the University of Rhode Island. **Continued on next page**

"During my ESL courses, I met a lot of great people. Everyone had a unique background, many from different countries and cultures. As an immigrant, I felt a bond with all of those people. Many of them, including me, struggled financially, but most have great potential, and, if given the opportunity, they can achieve great things. That is why the program is so important."

"TRIO has helped me figure out a game plan to finish school and obtain a degree in an area that I am passionate about," said Zaire Lambright of Providence, who is on track to graduate CCRI in Fall 2022 and plans to transfer to Brown University to double major in Psychology and Sociology. "My advisor [April Donahue] has been a phenomenal asset and guide throughout this process. She has not only helped me figure out a game plan to finish and graduate, but has also given me a renewed sense of confidence in myself, and the potential I have to achieve greater things in the pursuit of my degree."

USM TRIO Students Win National Competition and attend Annual COE Conference

Four students in the TRIO College Programs at USM have won a national competition and traveled to Atlanta to present their work. Patty Herbert, Amber Veilleux, Koos Mohamed, and Raha Daud created a civic engagement project as part of a competition hosted by the Council for Opportunity in Education (COE).

The students were part of a COE-sponsored book club, where they read John Lewis' Across That Bridge: A Vision for Change and the Future of America and heard from local guest speakers. As part of the experience, COE challenged its book clubs across the country to design a civic engagement project for their communities.

Herbert, Veilleux, Mohamed, and Daud created the winner, a project designed to respond to today's social injustices by engaging with students at a local high school and developing a program that provides a safe, welcoming space for students to express their thoughts and listen to others. Part of the project included a poster inviting students to a dialogue series and encouraging them to "Master your voice, educate, and advocate for yourself."

As the winners, the four students attended the 40th Annual COE Conference in Atlanta in September, where they presented their poster and shared how they plan to implement this program. Four students in the TRIO College Programs at USM have won a national competition and will travel to Atlanta to present their work. Big congrats to

Marian Belgrave-Howard attends COE Conference

On June 7, 2021 I received the following in an email from dear friend and TRIO icon Marian Belgrave-Howard ... Will you be in Atlanta this year? I will!

In response to the 40th anniversary celebrations for the Council for Opportunity in Education (COE) at its annual conference in Atlanta on September 11-15, Marian was determined to attend and wanted me to know of her plans three months in advance! I was somewhat concerned about an 85-year-old legend traveling alone to a large city, but together with help from a nearby nephew we navigated registration, hotel accommodations, travel details, and additional last minute invitations to special events. Many thanks go to Jordana Adelman and Angelica Vialpando at COE for their huge support in supporting Marian's visit from their end.

COE President Maureen Hoyler hosted a 'legends of COE' dinner on Sept. 11 with many of the TRIO professionals who were instrumental in the founding of COE and its early development. "It was an absolutely wonderful dinner. I met old friends that I had not seen in decades," shared Marian. She added that, "Seeing all the younger TRIO professionals represented growth and commitment. The old and new leadership took up from where we started in the 1970's and they grew the organization."

Among many colleagues and collaborators, Maureen renewed her connection with Oscar Hernandez, the Director of Project Stay in San Antonio, Texas. In the late 1970's they were given a 24-hour notice to testify in Congress in support of the TRIO budget. Oscar testified before a House committee, Marian presented in the Senate, beginning a strong tradition of TRIO advocacy for our funding and legislation.

"The gracious treatment from COE was really appreciated," said Marian. "I enjoyed every minute of the Conference, it was a wonderful, wonderful experience. To see the diversity of this group was invigorating. Everything that I heard and saw ... it was the most memorable thing that has happened for me in recent years."

Marian wanted to share a final thought for current TRIO counselors and leaders, "The big thing is the BELIEF in what we do. The belief and the love."
