Dedication to Jerry Ellis

This Newsletter Edition is Dedicated to our friend and colleague, Jerry Ellis.

Jerry Ellis, former Director of the Onward Program at UMaine, passed away on May 9, 2022 in Wesley Chapel, Florida.

Many of us who knew him personally appreciate how talented, determined, dedicated, compassionate and generous he was. Throughout his life, Jerry gave a helping hand to many people during their most difficult times always with kind, patient, loving support.

As a young man he walked in protest for civil rights in Selma, Alabama (1965) and later served in Vietnam vowing to serve his country but in his own way in peaceful service. He was awarded two Bronze Stars for meritorious service while serving as a US Army Captain. He was an American advisor to a South Vietnamese unit during its Hearts and Minds campaign.

An accomplished athlete, he won various competitions in cross country and track. His love of athletics continued throughout his life culminating in riding his road bike from the Pacific to the Atlantic Ocean and from Canada to Mexico. In addition to biking, Jerry completed three marathons including running the Boston Marathon. Jerry was inducted into the University of Maine's Sports Hall of Fame in 2019.

Jerry completed his under-graduate degree at UMaine, a Master in Divinity at Boston University and a Master's degree from the University of Oregon in Counseling. Professionally he worked at UMaine as the Director of the Onward Program dedicating his time, energy and love to helping students from diverse backgrounds attend and complete a college education. Many will remember him for his unwavering kindness and compassion for his students and coworkers. His strong leadership skills led him to serve as President of NEOA and as Director of the NEOA Arnold Mitchum Leadership Institute for several years. Many of his "students" benefitted from his thoughtful, supportive and introspective leadership style and as a result, his "graduates" have had the opportunity to excel in their own leadership positions, many in TRIO and GEAR UP positions throughout New England.

If athletics was his refuge and service his profession, his family was his greatest love. He leaves behind his wife, Ronnie, daughter Christine, two sons Nicolas and Lucas and 6 grandchildren. Jerry was predeceased by five younger siblings.

Adored by many, one student in particular started a scholarship in his name, the **Jerry Ellis Scholarship Fund**. In life he supported this fund and in his passing his family asks you to consider support of this scholarship so that the spirit of Jerry will live on helping students on their path at UMaine. 



"AMLI" – The Arnold L. Mitchem Leadership Institute for 2022-23 What is it and is it for you?

From AMLI Director, Craig Werth About AMLI - Cheers! I'm Craig Werth, Director of the Arnold L.



Mitchem Leadership Institute (AMLI, pronounced "am-lee"), since 2014. My connection with AMLI goes back to when it was conceived of, in 1997. I was at that first meeting of NEOA past presidents as they met to develop a way to foster the long-term health of the organization, and support its members and the mission of educational opportunity that we all serve. Fully established in 1998, the NEOA Leadership Institute is designed to provide participants an opportunity to build strong leadership skills and, in turn, enhance their program's ability to expand educational opportunities for the students they serve. AMLI is a year-long program of leadership development that meets for three, 3-day retreats during the year and culminates with a fourth gathering and presentation at the annual NEOA conference.

Who is it for? The Institute accepts up to fourteen EOP professionals with varied levels of experience for a year-long exploration of leadership styles and practice, working with experts from both within and outside the TRiO/GEAR UP/EOP community. Participants will engage in a variety of experiences, designed and expertly facilitated, to cultivate deep self-awareness, and strengthen their individual abilities and the programs they serve. They will work collaboratively with fellow EOP professionals from across New England; examining their careers and achievements; setting and/or rededicating themselves to short-term and long-term goals; and confronting professional challenges with renewed awareness, insight, creativity and confidence.

The Institute Design and Cost - The Institute will meet at the Marie-Joseph Retreat Center in Biddeford Pool, Maine (south-eastern Maine) for three, 3-day sessions in the months of November, January and March, -- from 1:00 PM on Day 1 to 1:00 PM on Day 3. We will also have a final meeting and group presentation at the NEOA Annual Conference in April of 2023. In addition to full participation at all sessions, participants will be expected to read leadership material and complete short assignments between the sessions. NEOA will cover the costs of programming, lodging and meals during each of the three sessions over and above the tuition cost. Participants and/or the programs they represent will be expected to cover travel expenses for sessions and costs related to the NEOA Annual conference. The Institute tuition fee for this year is \$750. This tuition fee is an allowable cost for TRIO and GEAR UP.

<u>Application Process</u> – Applicants must be a current member of NEOA and submit a 3-part application by August 24, 2022. Visit here for the application: https://www.neoaonline.org/a-professional-li.php

Participants will be selected by a committee of NEOA Board members based upon the strength of the application, with special attention given to the personal statement and to the applicant's demonstrated commitment to their community and profession. The committee will select some participants who have considerable experience and some who are relatively new. The compliment of "seasoned" and new participants has created a potently positive synergy in the past. The selection committee will strive to ensure that each class of participants represents the rich diversity of the NEOA membership and includes participation from different ethnic groups, programs, and geographic areas of our region.

I'm proud to serve as Institute director for this, my fifth term. I humbly follow in the footsteps of some amazing leaders. I was a participant myself in one of the earliest classes, and I served as a presenter for several more years. My enduring connection with NEOA through this role is a great honor and opportunity for me – to reconnect, to put in practice my own leadership style, and to guide and learn from the community of educational opportunity champions who will form the class of 2022-23. After reviewing this information and the application process, please do not hesitate to contact me directly with any comments or questions. Thanks to the Board of NEOA for their support and trust, and to previous directors, especially Gerry Ellis and Sigh Searles, who provided support and an excellent foundation of work for me to draw from and build upon.

The NEOA 2022 annual conference was held in Portsmouth New Hampshire from April 13-15th. There were 50 participants who participated in the pre-conference. The 30 conference committee members put together an amazing conference that included 25 workshops, a plenary session on critical issues for higher education in a post-pandemic world, and Washington and COE updates. Policy Seminar Update

Teams from all 6 New England states gathered in Washington DC in March for the annual Policy Seminar. This was a special year for NEOA because both Senator Collins from Maine and Senator Hassan from New Hampshire were featured speakers. They certainly reiterated their support for TRIO programs. For the first time ever in history, a Secretary of Education spoke to us in person. Of course, this is Dr. Miguel Cardona-originally from Connecticut! His wife participated in Upward Bound and he is a supporter of our programs.

During the Legislative Conference this year, 27 meetings were held in person or virtually with legislators from New England. This represents 82% of all of our legislators. Additional meetings were held after the event when teams returned home. This year, 17 alumni of TRIO programs were involved in the legislative visits. The powerful stories from these alums is what really makes an impression on the legislators and helps them to understand the immense value that these programs provide.

Each year COE determines what we should ask for when we visit our legislators. This year these were the "asks":


- Would the member support at least a \$170 million increase? 96% of the legislators that were visited said YES!
- Will the member sign the annual TRIO funding letter for FY23? 96% of the legislators said YES!
- Will the member include TRIO funding in the top 10 on their list of priorities.

 19% said YES. Many legislators indicated that it was too early in the process to establish priorities.

Overall, this was a very positive event for TRIO programs in New England. We are fortunate to have significant support from both Democrats and Republicans. This only happens because we are continually building relationships. If you are having an event on your campus, please consider reaching out to one of your legislators and inviting them to come and visit. Or invite them to your summer program. These are wonderful opportunities to show the great work that we do.

Zac was a student from Manchester West High School that has overcome some unbelievable challenges. He began his college career at the University of NH with both home and food insecurities and had to work too many hours just to remain enrolled in college. Zac stayed connected to Talent Search during his entire college career and he participated in the TRIO Scholars Student Support Services at UNH. Zac worked with Melissa to transfer to Plymouth State University (PSU), where Admissions Director Matthew Wallace helped him to get a job working for the institution as a Community Advisor. This not only gave him a place to live whether school was in or out of session, he no longer had to pay for room and board. Zac did not have to work as many hours and he participated in the TRIO PASS Student Support Services program at PSU. Zac graduated from PSU as the top male student with his Bachelor's degree and we walked, with one of his mentors (Melissa) with his MBA. Zac also attended Melissa's dissertation defense and shared his story to support Melissa's research findings relating to student persistence of low-income first-generation college students. We are so proud of Zac for his unyielding persistence in the face of extreme adversity, and we predict that he will be one of our TRIO Achievers



With the help of Matt Morrin (UMFK Dean of Students), participants spent time learning and applying facets of a well-known customer service model to their programs and work with students, particularly how programs create a world-class, personal and magical experience that aids retention. In the afternoon, attendees participated in a series of Liberating Structures (liberatingstructures.com) facilitated by Ginny Ward, aimed at building connections, sharing challenges, & reflecting on resilience. The day culminated in sharing both the micro- & macro-opportunities to advocate for our programs. With so many best practices, successes, and resilience to celebrate, participants shared the even small ways they can use their spheres of influence to promote their programs' success and advocate for more support from their institutions, state government and their US delegation.





MassEdCO's GEAR UP Program Hosts Career Fair

MassEdCO's GEAR UP program recently hosted a career fair for North High Seniors. 23 local businesses, trades, and public service organizations participated in the event and spoke with over 225 NHS seniors. These speakers included the Worcester Police and Fire departments, Polar Beverages, QCC admissions, U.S Army, Navy and Marines, MA Army National Guard, YouthBuild, Worcester Emergency Communications (911,) Peterson School, and the City of Worcester Division of Youth Services. The career fair had 3 main objectives; the first was for local businesses to offer summer employment opportunities to students. The second was to introduce students to a wide variety of jobs that could offer on-the-job training and provide benefits with a healthy living wage. The third was to introduce students to jobs for which they could begin working and earning money immediately but would also help them pay for their college education. When asked about his opinion of the NHS GEAR UP College Fair one student replied, "I think this career fair is a really good opportunity for students to see what they want to do after high school and to find their true passion to have a successful life."

The GEAR UP staff would like to express their gratitude to all of the organizations and NHS staff who gave their time to collaborate for this very successful event.
