Connecticut State Liaison, David Celotto: "Bridge to College Division Director at Naugatuck Valley Community College. I have spent 8 years as a high school science teacher in Waterbury and have worked with GEAR UP/TRIO since 2012. The smiles on the faces of students and families when they realize their hopes, dreams, and goals are within reach. To continuously develop my leadership skills through the guidance and support of my NEOA colleagues."

Maine State President, Dori Fellman: "College Transition Coordinator - GEAR UP ME (statewide). This position 1.5 years, 4 years SSS TRIO Director, 12 years UMF GEAR UP Partnership Grants (7 years as Director, 5 as College Access Coordinator). Working in this field for 17.5 years. Seeing low income, first generation students succeed in college and career. Maine State Liaison, Laurie Davis: "Executive Director TRIO Programs, Upward Bound & Student Support Services at the University of Southern Maine, Portland, ME. I have worked in TRIO for ten years. The opportunity to change lives, families and communities is what excites me about working in TRIO. I enjoy working directly with students, doing financial and administrative work that supports USM grants and contributing to policy changes that remove barriers for low-income and first-generation students. I hope to learn and contribute to the future of TRIO through NEOA board work, thinking about how NEOA can better support TRIO staff and students we serve." **New Hampshire State President, Josh Gagnon**: "I am currently the Interim Director of the Upward Bound program at the University of New Hampshire. I have been working at UNH UB for a little over 3 years and spent 8 years as a teacher prior to my time at UNH (with a special shout out to the U Maine Farmington Upward Bound program, where I spent 4 summers working and discovering my true calling in life). I love my job because I get to be a beacon of light for my students and watch them achieve their goals and develop into confident young adults. I am looking forward to sharing conversations with, and



learning from, colleagues throughout New England. These shared experiences will not only benefit those of us on the board, but also our programs and the students we all work with!"

New Hampshire State Liaison, Christopher Lee: "I am an Educational Coordinator at Plymouth State University and I have been working in the TRIO field for just over 3 years. I love that my job allows me to help other make their dream of graduating from college come true. The best part being that I get to see my future students go on to make great things of their lives, even after having such rough beginnings. Thanks to the exceptional and persistent efforts of the TRIO Community and our supporters the Jason Lewis Amendment designed to transfer \$60 million in funding from TRIO (and \$10 million from GEAR UP to career and technical education programs failed overwhelmingly in the House of Representatives. Thank you to all who were able to call your representatives!!!
